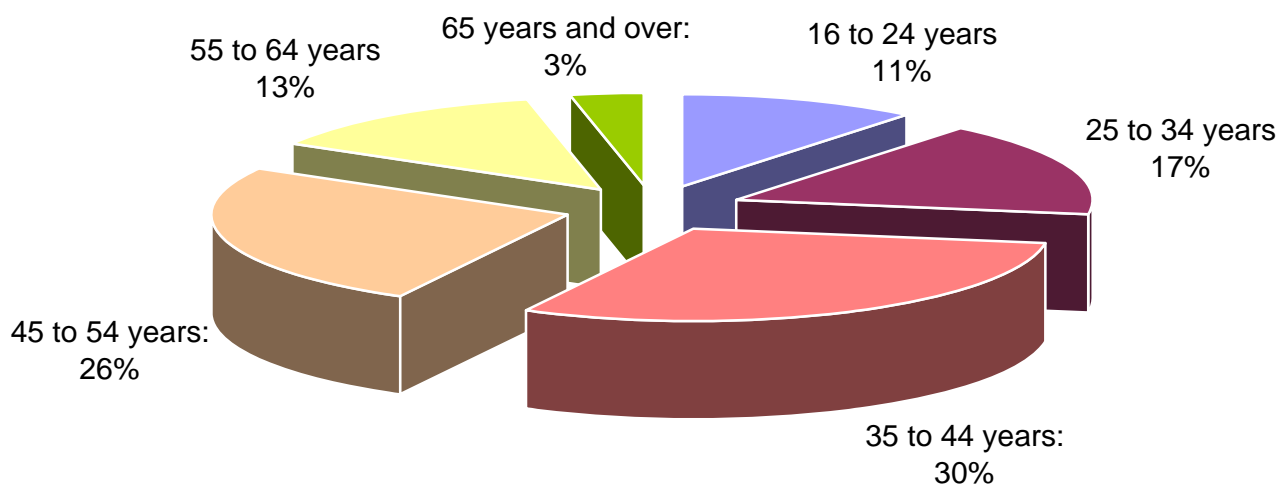

Definitions and notes

Civilian Labor Force

The term, labor force, here refers to the civilian labor force. That is the total number of non-institutionalized civilians, aged 16 and over, who are working or are actively seeking work and are available for employment. Mathematically, it is the sum of employed plus unemployed.

The Douglas County labor force is a component of the population that lives in Douglas County regardless of where they work.

Employment

Employed persons consist of all persons 16 years of age or older who did any work for pay or profit during the survey reference week; persons who did at least 15 hours of unpaid work in a family-operated enterprise; and persons who were temporarily absent from their regular jobs because of illness, vacation, bad weather, industrial dispute or various personal reasons.

Unemployment

Persons 16 years of age or older are classified as unemployed if they do not have a job, have actively looked for work in the prior 4 weeks and are currently available for work. Persons who were not working and were waiting to be recalled to a job from which they had been temporarily laid off are also considered unemployed. The unemployment rate represents the number unemployed as a percent of the labor force.

The unemployment figures described and charted here are not seasonally adjusted.

Occupation

The kind of work a person does to make a living. Occupations are specific jobs usually found in several industries. For example, cafeteria worker is a service occupation found in many different industry sectors, including services (schools, hospitals, businesses), the trade sector (eating establishments, department stores), or in manufacturing industries.

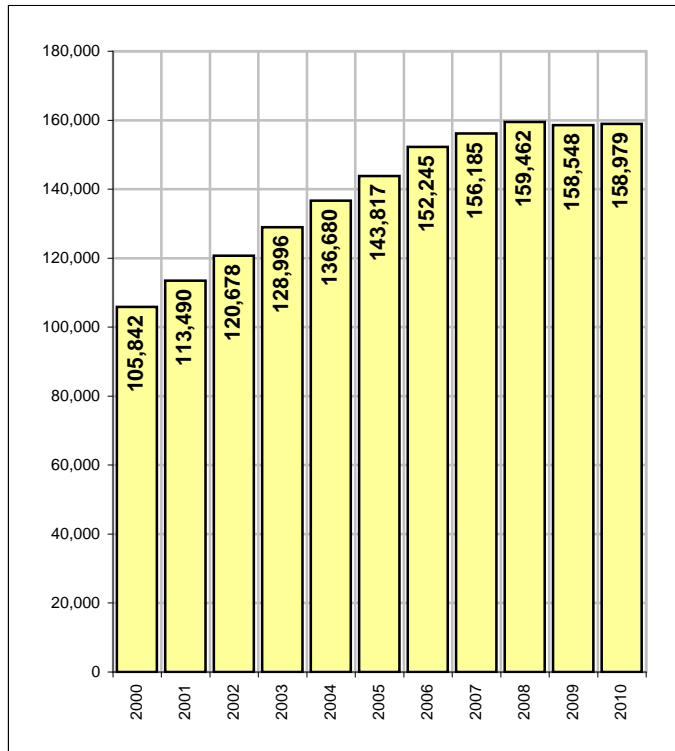

Annual labor force

The average annual labor force in Douglas County during 2010 was 158,979.

Since the year 2000, the Douglas County labor force has grown from 105,842 to 158,979, a change of 53,137 for a 50% increase. The average annual change since 2000 has been an increase of 5,314 per year at an average annual growth rate of 4.2%.

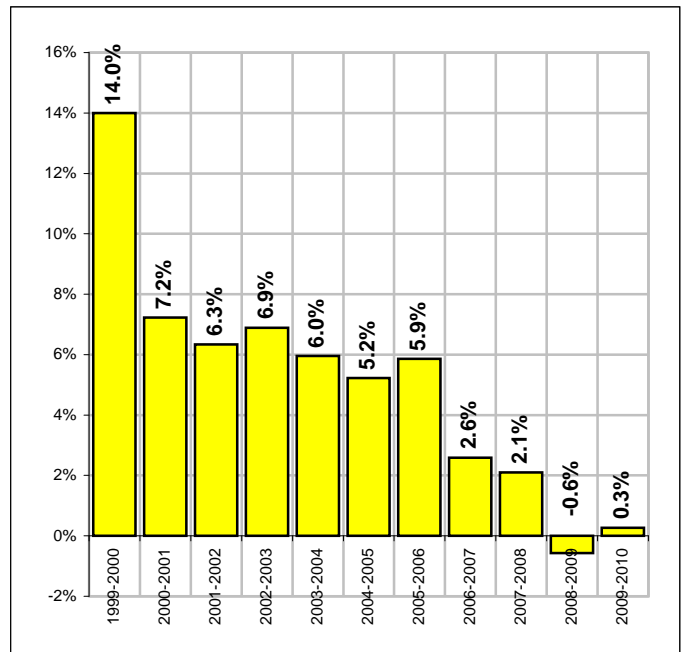
ANNUAL LABOR FORCE

From 2009 to 2010, the average annual labor force grew 0.3%, rising from 158,548 to 158,979. The change was a gain of 431 persons in the labor force.

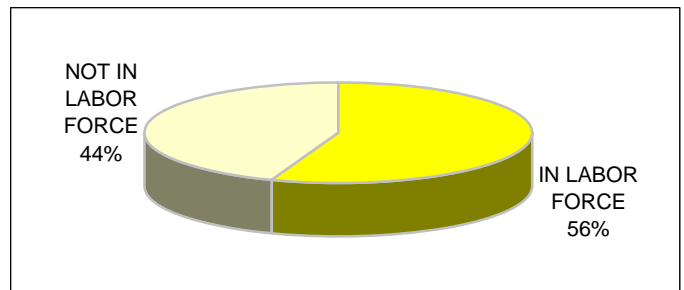
ANNUAL GROWTH RATES

TOTAL POPULATION SHARES

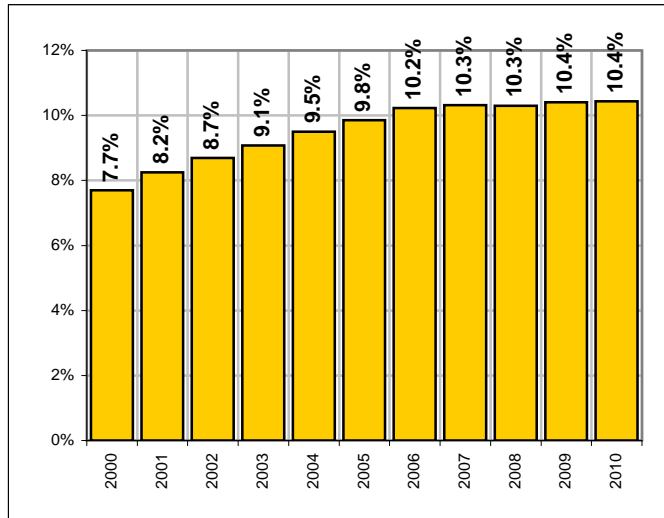

Metro area labor force shares

The share of the Denver Metro Area labor force residing in Douglas County has grown from 7.7% in 2000 to 10.4% in 2009 and 2010.

DOUGLAS COUNTY SHARE 2000-2010

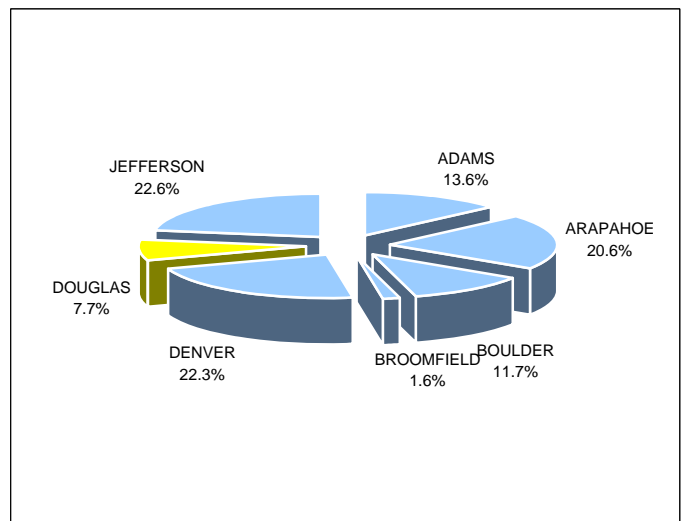

Douglas County has made the largest gains in share, of all Metro Area counties, during this decade. Arapahoe, Denver, and Jefferson counties have all declined in share.

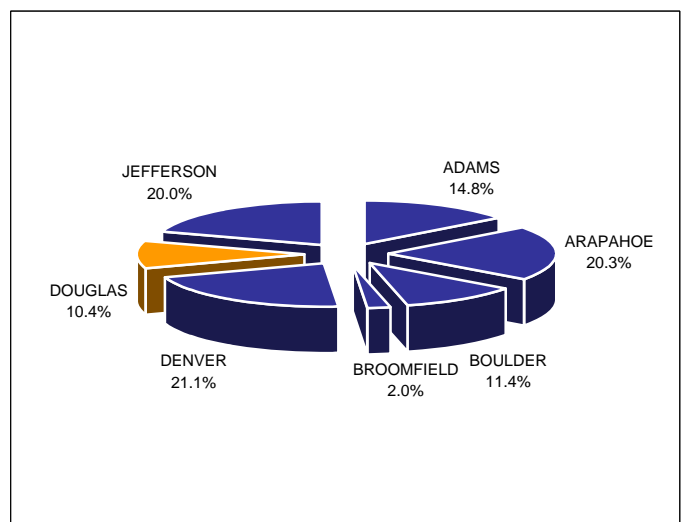
There are two factors at play in this trend toward a higher share of the Denver Metro Area labor force in Douglas County. One is the high growth of population in the County. The population of Douglas County went from a 7.3% share of the Denver Metro Area population in 2000 to a 10.3% share in 2010. A total of 29% of the net increase in population in the Denver Metro Area was located in Douglas County. Secondly, Douglas County has a higher labor force participation ratio than any other county in the Denver Metro Area. There is some discussion of labor force participation rates on page 15 of this report. A total of 36% of the net increase in the Denver Metro Area labor force from 2000 to 2010 has been located in Douglas County.

Metro area labor force growth rates

The Douglas County labor force growth rate has slowed from a 7.2% rate in 2000 to a -0.6% rate in 2009 and then back up to 0.3% in 2010. The declining growth rate has brought Douglas County much closer to the growth rate of the rest of the Metro Area counties.

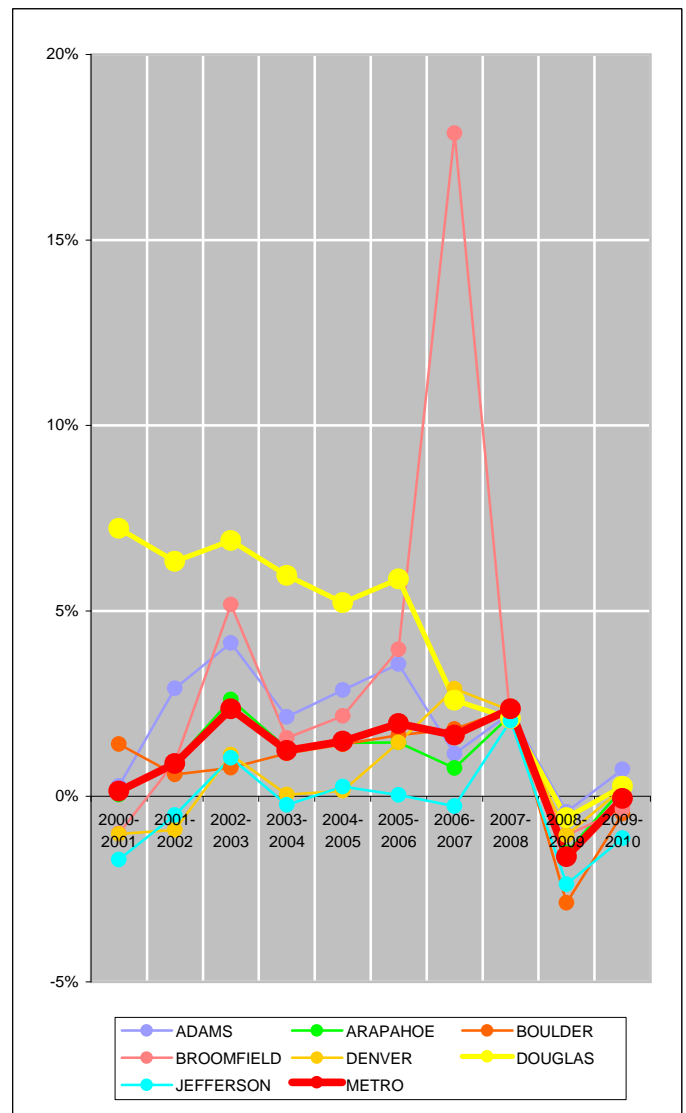

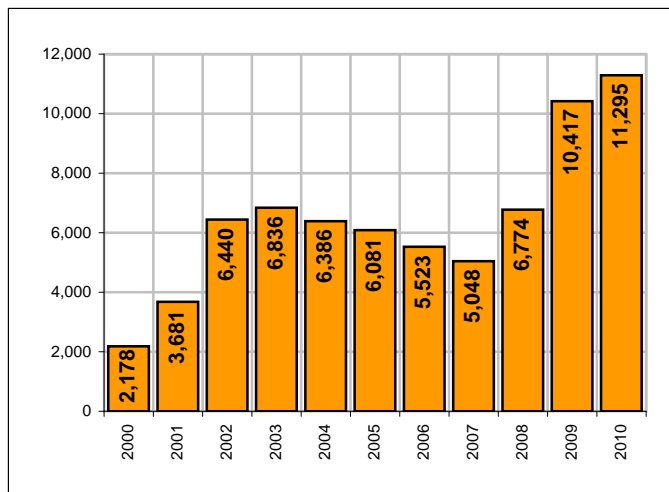
Average annual unemployment

The number of unemployed Douglas County residents reached an all time high in 2010 with an average annual figure of 11,295.

The annual average number of unemployed persons in Douglas County in 2010 was 878 more persons than in 2009, representing an 8.4% increase in one year.

The average of all the annual averages since the year 2000 is now 6,424 unemployed persons.

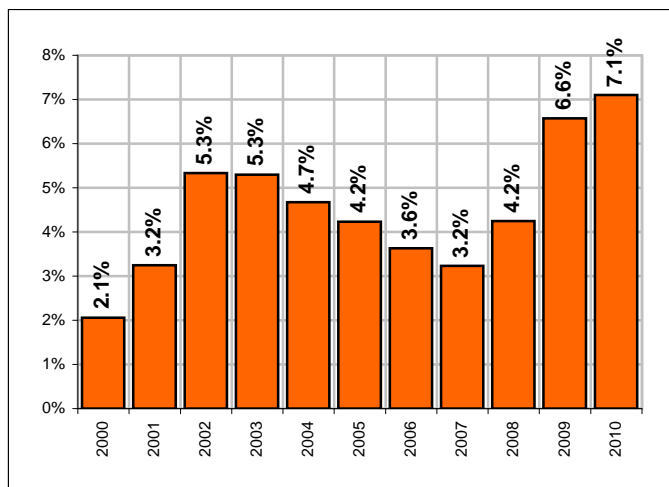
AVERAGE ANNUAL UNEMPLOYMENT

The average annual unemployment rate rose to 7.1%, the highest rate ever seen in the County.

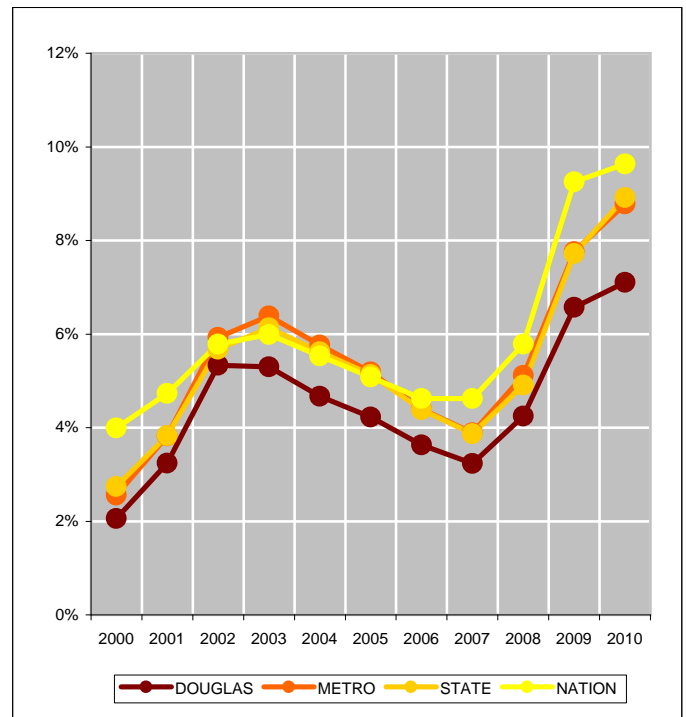
AVERAGE ANNUAL UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

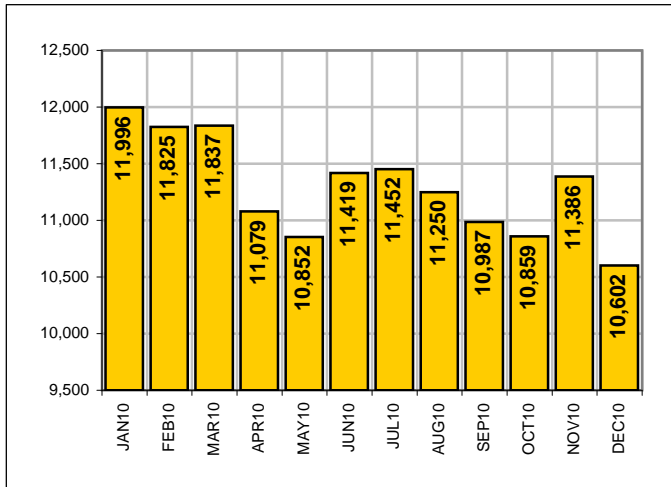

While the annual average unemployment in Douglas County was 11,295 in 2010, the monthly figure started the year out at 11,996 in January 2010.

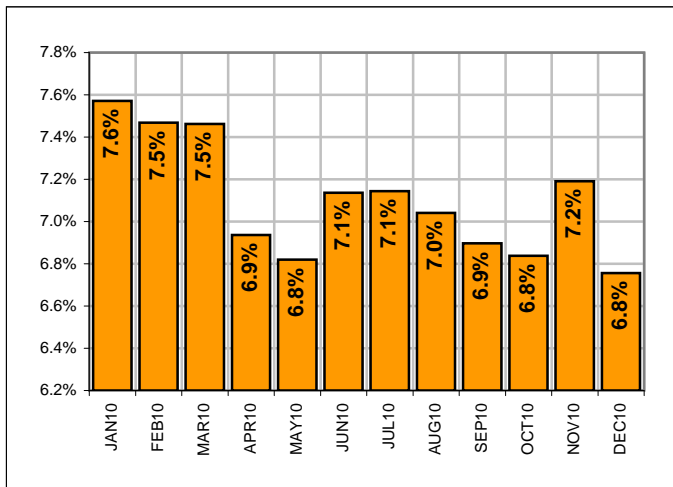
MONTHLY UNEMPLOYMENT

On a monthly basis, the unemployment rate in Douglas County peaked at 7.6% in January 2010.

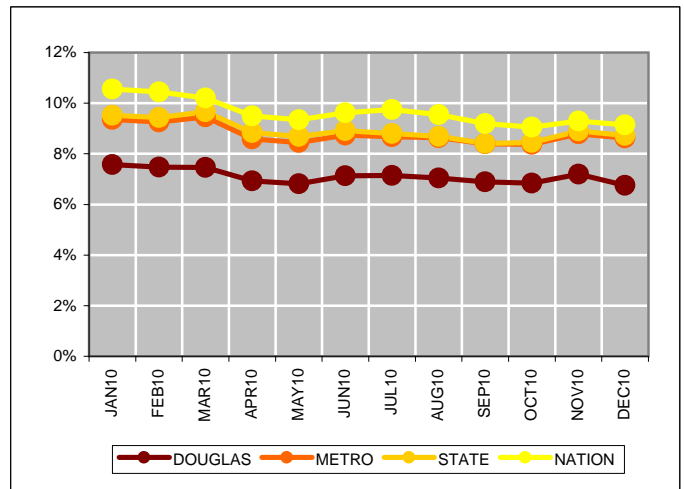
MONTHLY UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

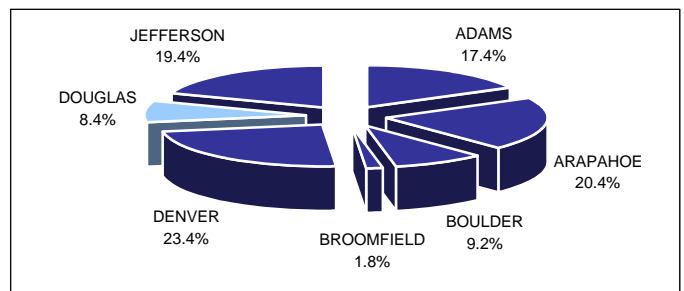

2010 SHARES OF UNEMPLOYED PERSONS

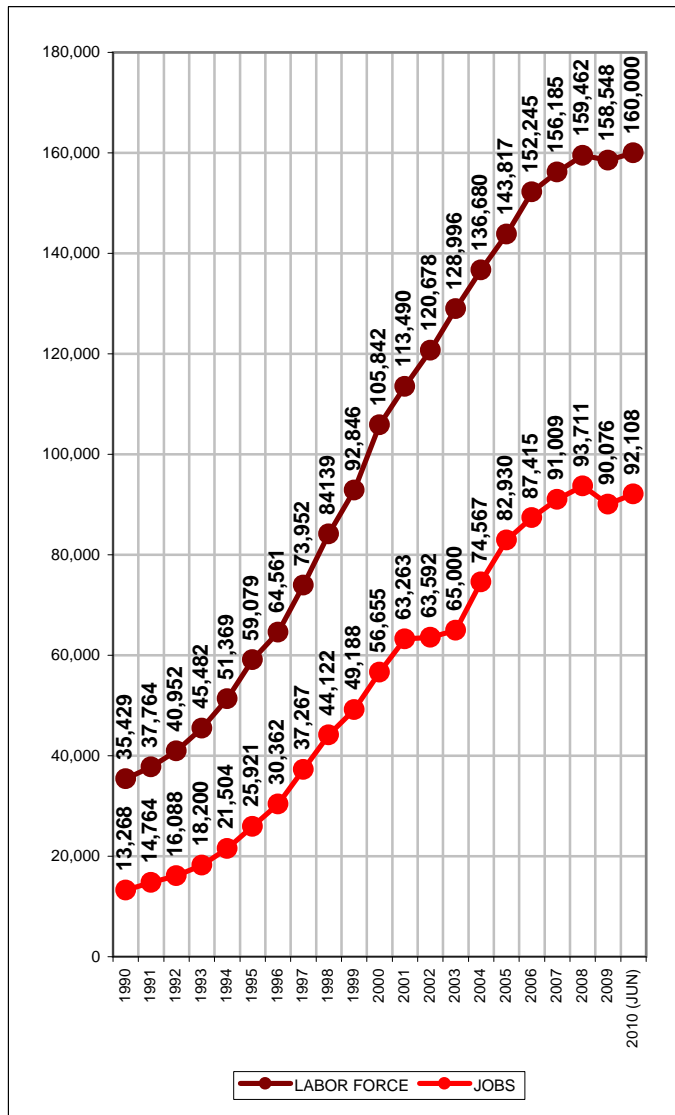

Jobs in Douglas County vs. the labor force

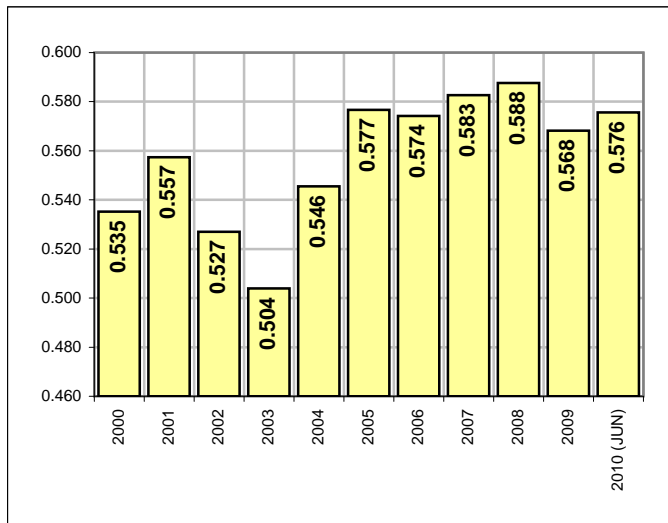
Jobs in Douglas County have been growing at a faster rate than the Douglas County labor force. Since the year 2000, the number of jobs in Douglas County has increased 63%, while the labor force has grown 51%.

School enrollment by age

School enrollment increased 68% from the 2000 Census to the 2009 American Community Survey. Total enrollment grew by 35,509 persons in that time frame. The largest volume changes were in the three age groups covering elementary through high school. The largest percentage gain was in the 20 to 24 year old bracket which saw a 219% increase in enrollment.

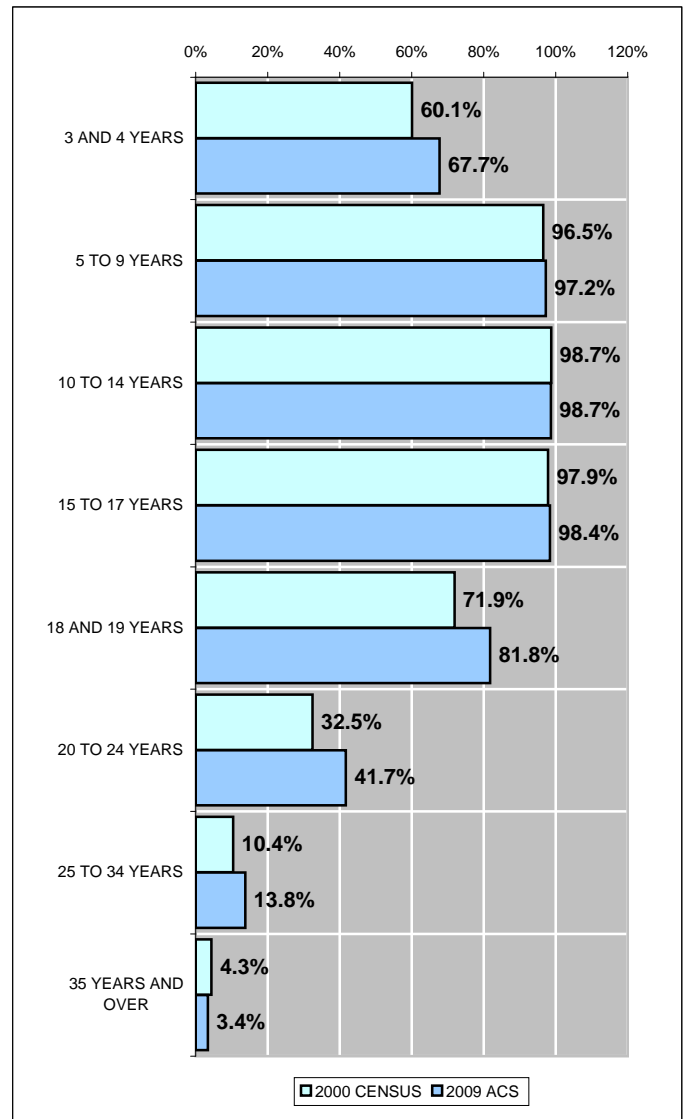

College or graduate school enrollment by age

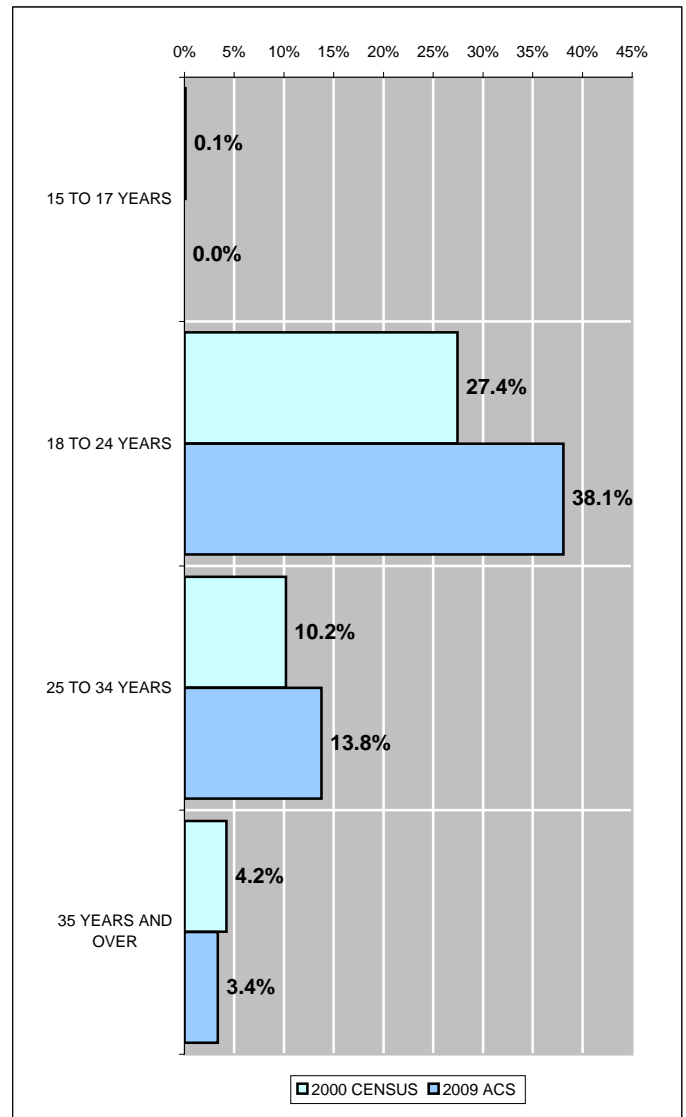
College and graduate school enrollment grew 93% from the 2000 Census to the 2009 American Community Survey. Total volume increased by 8,136 persons. The greatest volume of the increase was in the 18 to 24 year old age group with a net gain of 5,137 persons. That represented a 231% increase in volume from the 2000 Census to the 2009 American Community Survey.

Educational attainment

From the 2000 Census to the 2009 American Community Survey, Douglas County gained 50,743 residents with some level of college degree. The net change of the combined total population aged 18 years and over, with a college degree, was a 75% increase compared with a 69% growth in overall population aged 18 years and over and a 64% increase in total population.

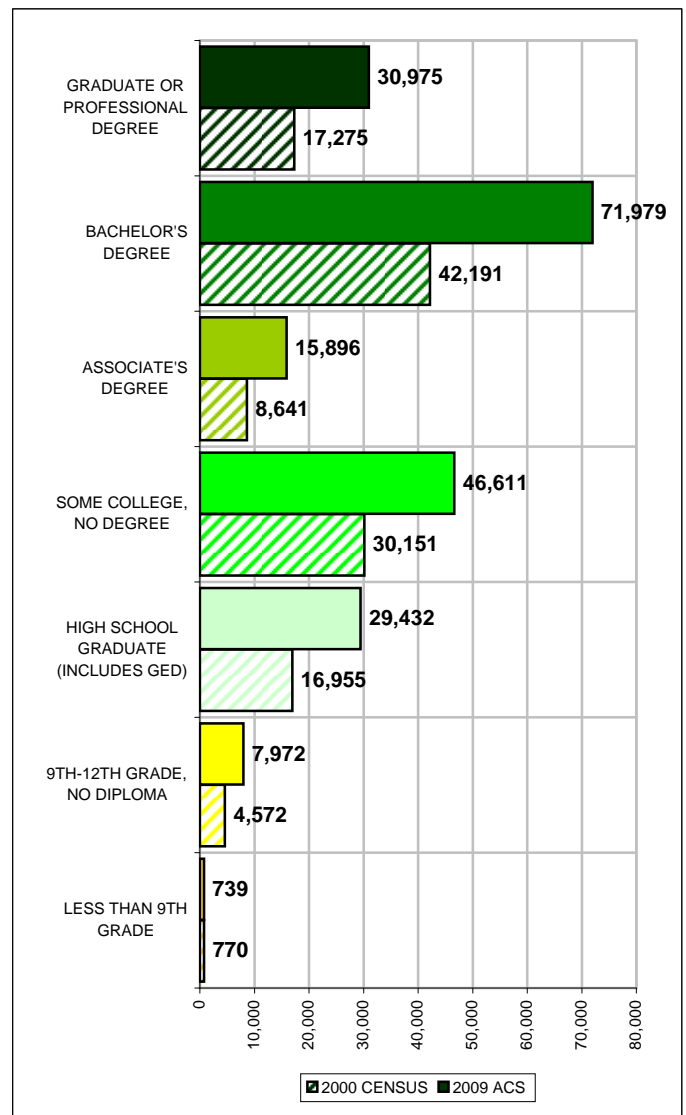
Residents with a Graduate or Professional degree increased 79% during the current decade.

2000 AND 2009 EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

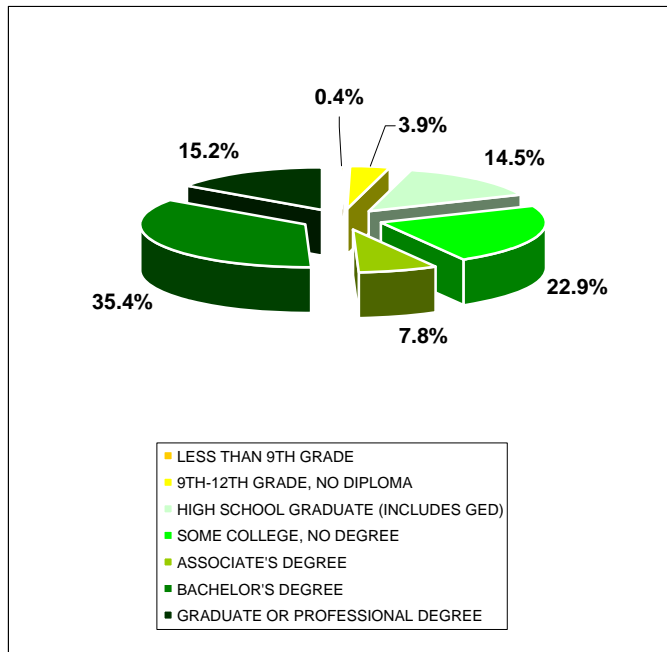

Educational attainment shares

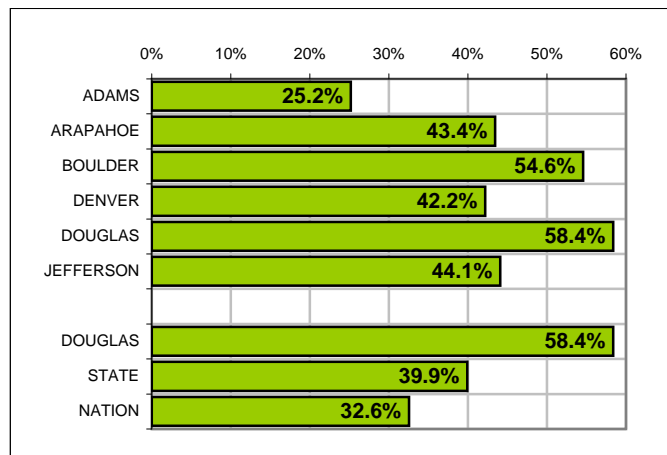
A total of 58% of Douglas County residents, aged 18 years and over, have attained some level of college degree, either an Associate's degree, a Bachelor's degree, or a Graduate or Professional degree. That share is higher than any other county in the Denver Metro Area and far higher than the State or National shares. Only 4.3% of Douglas County residents, aged 18 and over, have not received a high school diploma or GED.

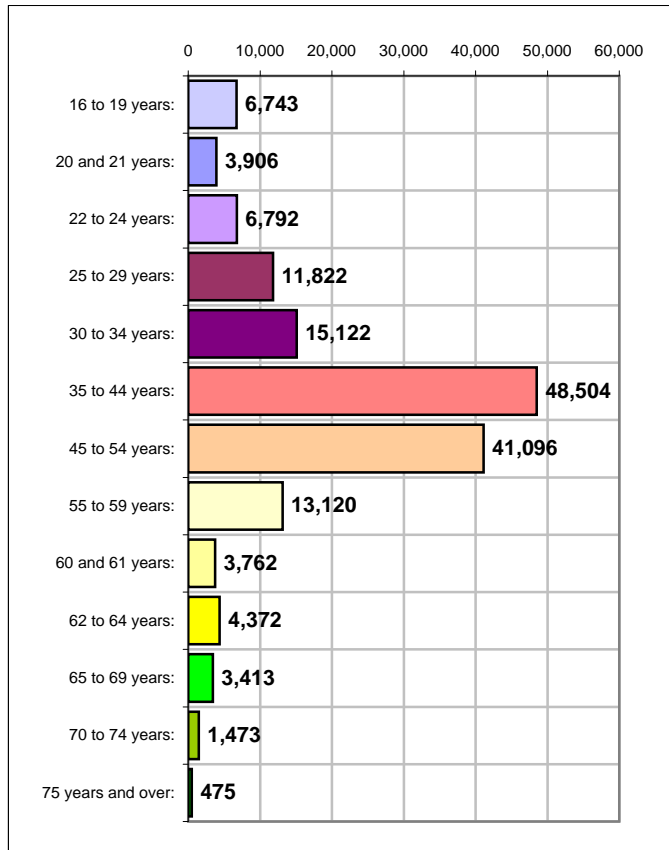
Labor force age distribution shares

The largest share of the labor force in Douglas County is in the 35 to 44 year old group with 48,504 persons, representing 30% of the labor force.

The median age in Douglas County is 36.6 years, giving the County a ranking of #335 out of 805 counties covered by the American Community Survey.

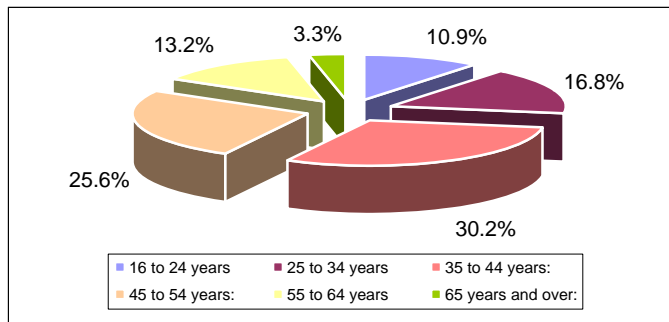
At 76%, Douglas County has the highest labor force participation rate in the Denver Metro Area and much higher than the State and National averages. The labor force participation rate is calculated by dividing the number of persons in the labor force by the total population in that age group, which in this case is all persons aged 16 years and over.

DOUGLAS COUNTY LABOR FORCE



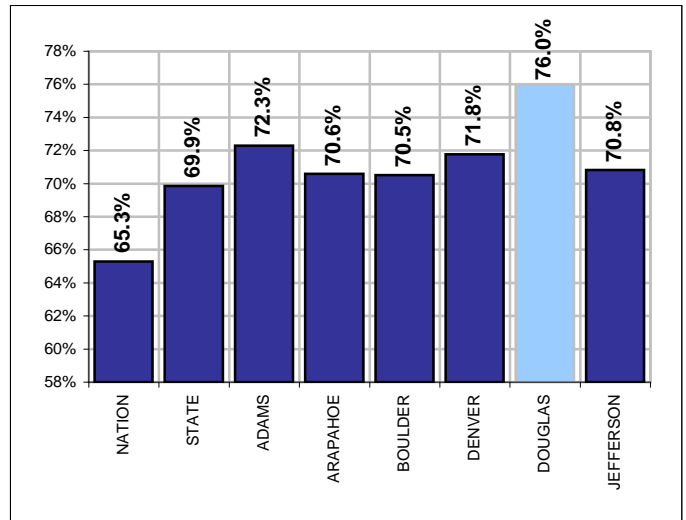

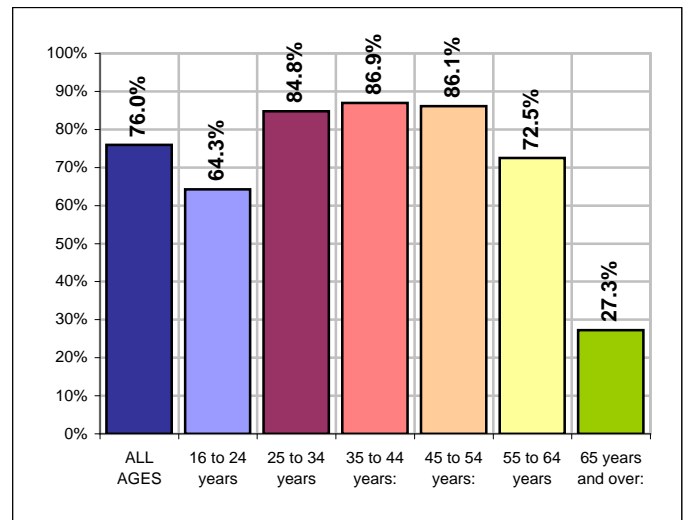
LABOR FORCE PARTICIPATION RATES

Place of work

Douglas County has the second highest share, in the Denver Metro Area, of its workers working outside the county of residence. Commuters to jobs outside the County make up 60% of the work force in Douglas County. That rate is much higher than the State and National shares.

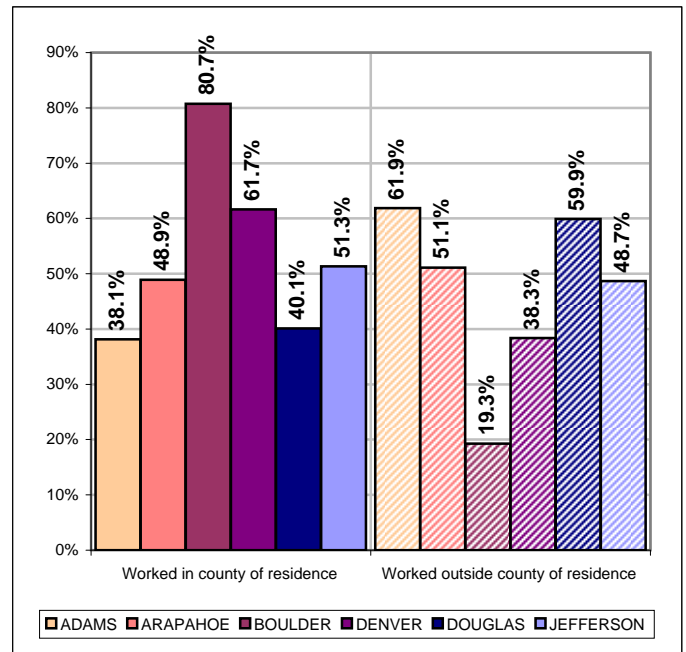

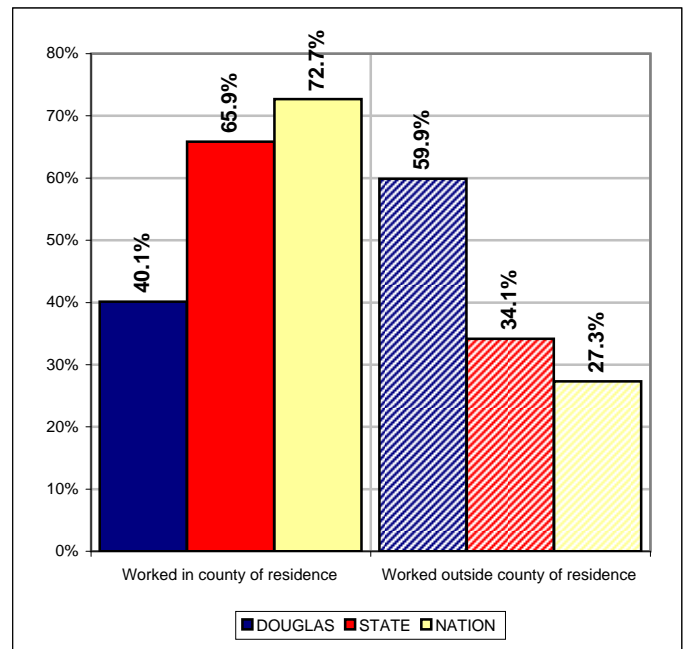

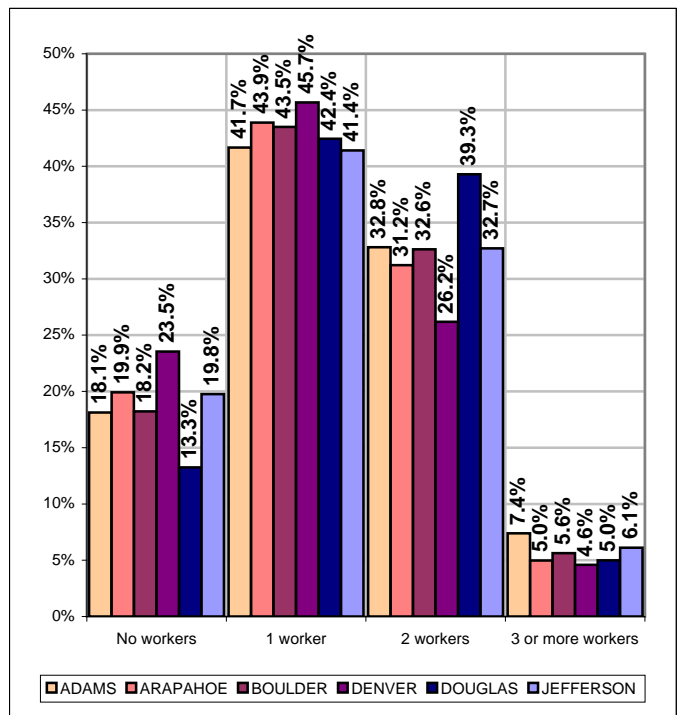

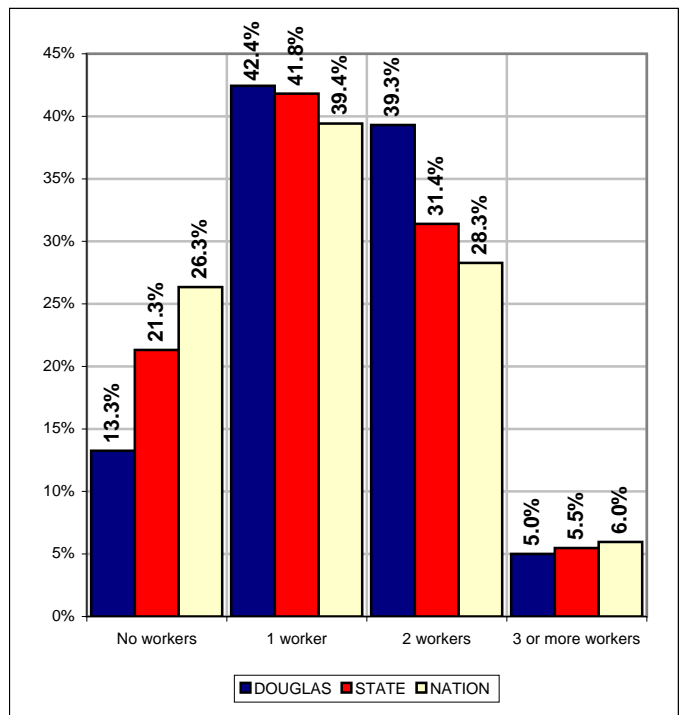
