DOUGLAS COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE DOUGLAS COUNTY RECREATION AND TOURISM PLAN

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. § 30-28-106(1), it is the duty of the Douglas County Planning Commission to make and adopt a master plan for the physical development of the unincorporated territory of Douglas County; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. § 30-28-108, the Planning Commission may amend, extend, or add to a master plan or carry out any part of it into greater detail from time to time; and

WHEREAS, in 2004, the Planning Commission adopted the Resolution PC04-003, amending the Comprehensive Master Plan to include a Recreation and Tourism Element; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, the Planning Commission amended the 2030 Douglas County Master Plan and adopted the 2035 Douglas County Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Recreation and Tourism Plan identifies recreation and tourism opportunities in Douglas County with a recreation and tourism inventory; and

WHEREAS, the information provided in the County Plan describes how the County intends to provide for the recreational and tourism needs of both residents and visitors of Douglas County; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. §30-28-107, the Planning Commission directed staff to engage the County citizens in a public outreach process in support of the update to the Recreation and Tourism Plan in order to better coordinate it into the comprehensive master plan for the County; and

WHEREAS, the Recreation and Tourism Plan has been reviewed by the Planning Commission in order to meet the requirements of C.R.S. § 30-28-106(5) for the comprehensive master plan to indicate how the County shall provide for the recreation and tourism needs of its residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has considered oral and written public comments throughout the process of developing it; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission considered the Recreation and Tourism Plan at a properly noticed public hearing held on July 10th, 2017.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Douglas County Planning Commission that:

1. The Recreation and Tourism Plan dated July 10th, 2017, including any amendments approved by the Planning Commission by motion in the public hearing held on

July 10th, 2017, all of which are incorporated herein and made a part hereof by this reference, is hereby adopted for the unincorporated area of Douglas County superseding the Recreation and Tourism Plan approved November 22, 2004.

- 2. The Director of Community Development is authorized to make appropriate corrections to the grammar, syntax, and format to any reprinted copies of the Recreation and Tourism Plan.
- 3. A copy of the amended Recreation and Tourism Plan, and a copy of this resolution, shall be certified to the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Douglas, State of Colorado and to the Planning Commissions of all municipalities and towns within Douglas County.

PLANNING FOR RECREATION AND TOURISM

Douglas County's extensive natural resource base and rich rural heritage are the foundation of the existing recreation and tourism industry. Both private and public interests provide recreation and tourism opportunities. Community groups, clubs, private vendors, and governments sponsor a variety of festivals and cultural activities that can occur in different locations around the County and bring residents and tourists together.

The Colorado General Assembly enacted House Bill 01S2-1006 in 2002, requiring local governments to adopt a recreation and tourism element with their Master Plan. Colorado Revised Statute (C.R.S.) 30-28-106(3) (a)(5) states that the intent of this is to "provide for the recreational and tourism needs of residents of the county and visitors to the county through delineated areas dedicated to, without limitation, hiking, mountain biking, rock climbing, skiing, cross country skiing, rafting, fishing, boating, hunting, shooting, or any other form of sports or other recreational activity, as applicable, and commercial facilities supporting such uses."

In order to fulfill the increasing need, Douglas County has created a Recreation and Tourism Plan to identify current opportunities and future needs. Adopted as a sub-section of the Douglas County 2035 Comprehensive Plan, the Recreation and Tourism Plan establishes a foundation for future recreation and tourism planning.





DEFINITIONS

It is important in discussing recreation and tourism to establish basic definitions. These definitions were developed with the 2004 Recreation and Tourism plan and have been discussed and revised through a series of public outreach meetings.

RECREATION

The revitalization of the mind and body through directed and non-directed physical or passive activity.

TOURISM

Travelling outside one's own community to seek out experiences different from one's everyday activities. Visitors can be attracted to an area for the experience of natural features such as climate, landforms, water, flora and fauna, or a variety of man-made features, such as recreation, culture, and heritage.

CULTURAL TOURISM

The pursuit of enrichment inside or outside of one's community.

HERITAGE TOURISM

Travelling to experience the places, activities and events that authentically represent the stories and people of the past and present.

RECREATION AND TOURISM PROVIDER

Any public or private group, agency, or business that offers recreation and/or tourism opportunities, events, and experiences.

A CHANGING ECONOMY

Douglas County experienced steady economic growth between 2004 and 2014, even with the recession in 2009. The County gained new businesses and approximately 100,000 more residents. Data from the Office of Economic Development and International Trade shows that Douglas County also had growth in industries serving tourism and travel. Travel spending more than doubled during this time period, with retail sales increasing 67%. The number of jobs linked to travel increased 67% compared to 44% for all jobs.

Although tourism and travel spending is a smaller portion of the Douglas County economy than the economies of Colorado mountain communities, they do play a role for local businesses. As noted earlier, the amount of travel spending in Douglas County increased between 2004 and 2014, and some travel indicators, such as service jobs and retail sales, increased more than the overall economy.



DEMOGRAPHICS

Over the past decade, the population of Douglas County increased 33%. The number of jobs in the County increased 44% and retail sales increased 67%. The median household income of the County remained in the top ten of large counties in the country. The economic and demographic growth in the County did not occur uniformly. Economically, travel spending had a large impact on the economy. Demographically, the growth in the senior age group impacted the population significantly.

Since the 1990's, Douglas County has been a young county in terms of the age of its population. Families with children came for the good schools, houses, and abundant parks. Typically, the children leave and the parents remain which may explain the large increase in the 65 and over population. The total population of Douglas County increased 33% between 2005 and 2015, but the population 65 years and over increased 182%. Seniors moved from being 5% of the total population to 11% of the total. Statewide, the trend was similar; the older age groups increased faster than the younger age groups. In very few places was the change as dramatic as in Douglas County.

Two other demographic trends occurring nationwide are smaller average household sizes and increased racial and ethnic diversity. These are evident in Douglas County as well. Between 2000 and 2010, the average number of people in a household decreased from 2.88 to 2.79. Although the total population increased 62% during that time, the number of people who are Hispanic or Latino increased 141%. With changing demographics, recreation and tourism interests may shift in ways that may not have been previously considered. For instance, activities that may be considered passive for some generations may be considered active for others, such as gardening.



EFFECTS OF DEMOGRAPHICS ON RECREATION AND TOURISM

Trends in recreation and tourism have changed since 2004 as well, some reflecting the changing demographics. Outdoor recreation providers recognize the need to have multi-generational services and amenities. Some providers, like the National Park Service, are focusing on attracting users of all racial and ethnic backgrounds. The Douglas County Parks, Trails, and Open Space Plan has an objective to, "Provide an enhanced level of recreation opportunities and access to special populations at existing and new facilities." More specifically, this is achieved through providing Spanish, as well as English trailheads and trail signage.

Outdoor recreation is affected by changes in technology, specifically, hand-held cellular devices. This technology can give practical information about parks, trails, and open spaces, including directions, hours of operation, amenities, trail maps, warnings and alerts. Recreation providers could use this technology for interactive education, like identifying animals, plants, and geologic formations, explaining historic sites, or offering instruction on physical activities like rock climbing or snow-shoeing. However, people's focus on technology could distract them from experiencing and enjoying the outdoors.

Another form of recreation, arts and entertainment, received a big boost in Douglas County with the building of two cultural arts centers in 2011. The Lone Tree Arts Center and the Parker Arts Culture and Events Center (PACE) have theaters and event spaces to host local and professional acts including theater,



music, dance, and visual arts. These two new facilities present an opportunity for an array of cultural arts to complement the County's tourism assets.

PREVIOUS PLANS

The 2004 Recreation and Tourism Plan was a response to the statutory requirement and began with a background of the statute and a basic inventory. It provided definitions derived through a technical advisory committee and methods of research and public participation.

The 2004 Plan provided one goal with three supporting objectives. Due to its allencompassing nature, the following goal is carried forward from the 2004 Plan:

> Support and enhance current recreation and tourism opportunities, while building a framework for future collaboration.

This goal serves as the foundation for the development and curation of recreation and tourism in Douglas County. Currently, Douglas County has numerous opportunities for recreation and tourism; therefore, it is important that the County maintain these



already existing features. Through upkeep and outreach, it will be possible to keep these attractions active while planning for the future of recreation and tourism. For both current and future opportunities, collaboration with partner entities and the municipalities may provide for a diverse array of activities, as well as ways to get information to the public.

Considering the fact Douglas County's population has increased by 33% in the past decade, one can see the need for continued support for recreation opportunities. However, it is important that while Douglas County provides additional opportunities the character of the County is preserved. With character in mind, through the Recreation and Tourism Plan, it may be possible for partnerships to develop new activities that may become regional attractions.

HOW THIS PLAN RELATES TO OTHER PLANS

As a sub-element of the Douglas County Comprehensive Master Plan, the Recreation and Tourism Plan reflects the current and future vision related to recreation and tourism. With respect to the Master Plan, the Recreation and Tourism Plan was established to supplement the broad goals of the County. The Cultural Plan is referenced to enhance the awareness of the Cultural Tourism opportunities in Douglas County. The Cultural Plan is maintained by the Douglas County Cultural Council, which works to establish partnerships for arts and culture throughout the County. The Parks, Trails, and Open Space Master Plan, also a sub-element of the Master Plan, is specific to community



values related to the development and management of publicly provided parks, trails and open space.

Although this Recreation and Tourism Plan affects Douglas County, municipalities within the County are required to have their own Recreation and Tourism Plan or a reference in their own Comprehensive Master Plans. The Town of Castle Rock has a stand-alone Recreation and Tourism Plan. The Town of Parker, City of Castle Pines, and the City of Lone Tree reference recreation and tourism within their respective Master Plans. This Plan was written to acknowledge others by reflecting the broader goal of collaboration and cooperation. In holding community outreach meetings, local government staff members and representatives shared their recreation and tourism vision for the County.

In addition to collaborating with municipalities through recreation and tourism, there are opportunities to highlight state and federal assets in the County. These include the Pike National Forest, state parks, and scenic byways within the County.

OUTREACH EFFORT

It was important to understand what recreation and tourism meant to the residents of Douglas County when updating the plan.

Starting with area experts such as economic development groups, recreation providers, and cultural resources stakeholders, five discussion topics were created. These topics included: Recreation, Tourism, Economic Development, Cooperation, and Technology. Feedback based on these themes established discussion points for five public outreach meetings held across the county.

Through this series of community meetings, Douglas County gave residents and stakeholders the opportunity to provide ideas and comments on the plan update. This discussion included how the County is performing currently, what could be improved, and how they envision the future of recreation and tourism. These conversations set the tone for moving forward.

MOVING FORWARD

Since the adoption of the first Plan in 2004, approximately 12 years ago, many factors of recreation and tourism have changed. The population increase is one of the most influential factors, as it increases the demand on current recreation and tourism opportunities. Having an increasing population requires additional amenities to provide opportunities for recreation and tourism, as well as meeting unmet demands. With growth being a topic of discussion at the outreach meetings, it was asked whether Douglas County should aspire to provide more recreation and tourism opportunities or if the municipalities should play a larger role in also providing these opportunities. While some input supported continued effort by the County around these issues, success in moving forward will depend upon partnering with local economic development entities, County-based municipalities, or other regional entities to continue providing quality recreation and tourism opportunities.

It is also important to keep in mind the rural character that encompasses a large part of the County. Through cultural and heritage tourism, it may be possible to preserve historic properties that tell the history of the County. Recreation and tourism opportunities, such as agri-tourism, or touring agricultural areas, farmers markets, equestrian areas and associated activities, can support agriculturebased businesses and help retain this part of the County's history and character for future generations.



During the outreach process, support for activities such as hunting and shooting were also highlighted as ways to reflect the rural values of the County.

Some County residents have expressed interest in motor sports, such as motorcross and riding ATVs. With a geographically diverse terrain, some areas of Douglas County, like the Pike National Forest, provide a good setting for this type of recreation. In addition to the diverse terrain, the County hosts many other opportunities for recreation ranging from hiking, mountain biking, fishing, cross country skiing, breweries, shopping, arts, a rich cultural and geological history, to a large amount of land for agricultural activities. By recognizing these diverse recreation and tourism opportunities, it will be possible to preserve and promote the activities that are offered in Douglas County.

In looking ahead, technology plays a large role in the potential of expanding, enhancing, and moving forward with new recreation and tourism opportunities. With smartphone applications, it is possible to access information about tourism and recreation activities throughout the County. Through the virtual museum, Douglas County provides a virtual tour of historic properties and artifacts that may not be accessible to the public, providing an opportunity to promote cultural tourism. Additionally, through the use of technology, information about and promotion of recreation and tourism opportunities in the County may be possible. A cooperative one-stop shop webpage for recreation and tourism could create an efficient method to share events and activities in and around Douglas County, regardless of jurisdiction.

Finally, impacts of recreation and tourism facilities on economic development may continue to be of importance. Concepts surrounding municipality or urban-based convention centers that could serve the region were discussed and may be the focus of some economic development entities. Alongside this is the importance of preserving the character of the non-urban areas of the County, and how these areas could serve as places for day-trip experiences. The influx of businesses, including some Fortune 500 companies and input from economic development experts indicate that Douglas County could potentially be a host of such tourism.

PURPOSE OF THE PLAN

This plan acknowledges that recreation and tourism support a full range of economic and social benefits, and recognizes that future development and continued success of existing venues depends on cooperation between public and private recreation interests, residents, and businesses. This plan also recognizes the link between land use decisions, recreation and tourism, and the importance of community character.

To support future recreation and tourism, the following is the main goal of this updated plan:

GOAL

SUPPORT AND ENHANCE CURRENT RECREATION AND TOURISM OPPORTUNITIES, WHILE BUILDING A FRAMEWORK FOR FUTURE COLLABORATION.

OBJECTIVE RT 1A

Create opportunities for partnership amongst County-based municipalities, public entities, private business, and service providers.

OBJECTIVE RT 1B

Utilize information technology to promote tourism opportunities and enrich interaction with the County's recreational and cultural assets.

OBJECTIVE RT 1C

Leverage existing facilities, the natural environment, and tourism opportunities to promote the unique character of the County.

To better delineate opportunities for recreation and tourism, an inventory of such opportunities is also provided.

This Inventory List is current as of July 10, 2017, the adopted date of this plan.
