

## The myths of voter fraud.

Elections can't be stolen. Colorado conducts audits and recounts to ensure results are accurate.

- Colorado conducts an <u>extensive audit (PDF)</u> of every election to ensure they are accurate.
- Colorado law automatically requires recounts in very close contests.

**Fraud is extremely rare and easily identified.** Colorado voting processes are designed to prevent fraud and ensure votes are accurately counted.

- Colorado elections are conducted by local county officials not the state or federal government.
- <u>Republican and Democratic election judges oversee (PDF)</u> processes in each county to ensure elections are fair. <u>Become a judge</u>.
- The voter registration system and signature verification process help prevent anyone from voting more than once and help identify anyone that does.
- Colorado is a member of the <u>Electronic Registration Information Center</u> which helps prevent anyone from voting in more than one state and helps identify anyone that does.

Fraud is prosecuted. Anyone attempting election fraud can be prosecuted.

- Under Colorado Law, ineligible voting or registration is a <u>felony</u> punishable by a fine of up to \$5,000.00, imprisonment in the county jail for up to 18 months, or both.
- Under Federal Law, voters and election officials can be <u>prosecuted</u> for numerous offenses.
