The other 60 counties (statutory counties) operate under state regulation



Goal


- Address Harmful Change in State Policies
- Limit State Regulation of Douglas County
- Obtain the authority granted Home Rule counties
- Provide for the unique local needs of the County
- Codify the County's identity
- Create real Local Control



Advantages

- Retain all the authority of statutory counties
- Design the County's government
- Opt out of state regulation
- Increased financial powers
- Increased lawmaking and local regulation
 - Unique laws on matters that are distinct on Douglas
 County





Process

- Home Rule is a County's Constitutional Right (Art. XIV, § 16)
- Nine-Step Process
 - Minimum 243 day process
 - Requires 21 member Charter Commission



Nine-Step Process

- Step 1 Initiating Resolution
 Action BOCC adopt Home Rule Resolution
- Step 2 Division of County
 Action BOCC adopt County Division Resolution
 and Post Election



Nine-Step Process

- Step 3 First Election 6/24/25
 Action Countywide election to 1.) Form Home
 Rule Commission, and 2.) Select Commissioners
- Step 4 First Home Rule Commission Meeting
 Action Elect Officers and Adopt Schedule



Nine-Step Process

Step 5 – Subsequent Commission Meetings
 Action – Approve public draft

Step 6 – Hold 3 Public Comment Meetings



Nine-Step Process

- Step 7 Approve Final Draft
 - Action Commission approves final draft and BOCC forwards final draft
- Step 8 Second Election
 - Action County-wide election to adopt Charter
- Step 9 Adopted Charter effective following January 1st



Home Rule Authority – Four Sources

1. Explicit statutory authority arises from State statutes governing Home Rule Counties.

Examples:

- Retain all existing authority and duties
- Elect structure of government
- Expanded law making
- Issuance of debt and tax districts
- Local fees and licenses



Home Rule Authority – Four Sources

2. Explicit statutory exemptions are State statutes that exclude home rule counties from state regulation.

Examples:

• State collective bargaining requirements



Home Rule Authority – Four Sources

- 3. <u>Implied exemptions</u> are matters not identified as "state concern" open to Home Rule County regulation.
- 4. <u>Discretionary authority</u> is the ability to enact ordinances covering issues not authorized in state statutes.

Examples of State Concern:

- TABOR
- Regulating public utilities
- Regulating ballot measures
- Regulating banking

Charter Content What Douglas Could Do -

- Preserve County Structure
- Preserve Property Rights
 - Policy Taxes Bags / Delivery
 - Gun ownership
- No DEI policies
- No COBCA

- Cooperation with ICE
- Local Election Laws
- Protect and fund law enforcement
- Explicitly exclude county from state regulation
- No state minimum wage
- Neighborhood parking regulation
